### ARVADA POLICE HAS SEEN INCREASED REPORTS OF FINANCIAL SCAMS SPECIFICALLY TARGETING OLDER ADULTS!

Help by sharing these tips with friends and family to avoid falling victim to a scam:

#### What do some common scam set-ups look like?

- Someone calls claiming to be a friend or family member that has been arrested, kidnapped, or in an accident, and needs money.
- You receive a message or call from someone claiming to be from your bank to advise you that your account has been compromised. They tell you to move your money to a new account that they have created for you.
- Someone calls claiming to be a law enforcement officer to inform you that a
  warrant has been issued for your arrest and you need to pay a fine to clear it.

Scammers will do everything they can to keep you on the phone and make the problem sound very urgent. They may know a lot of details about you, your family, and the organization they pretend to represent. They may make threats to prevent you from talking to law enforcement or friends and family.

### What can you do to avoid scams?

- Do not answer calls or texts from numbers you do not recognize.
- Do not provide any personal or financial information over phone, text, or email.
- Never pay for something if the person insists on using cryptocurrency, wire transfers, gift cards, payment apps, or by mailing cash.
- Verify who you are talking to by hanging up and calling them back on a verified phone number you source from a bank statement, organization website, etc.
- Do not click on computer pop-up notifications or call unverified support numbers.
- If it doesn't seem right, it probably isn't! Talk to someone you trust and see if the situation makes sense to them.
